

Deferred Disposition (DD) for eligible Class C violations

DD is a probation period up to 180 days, and up to \$400.00 Judge Nunley requires the defendant to adhere to certain conditions, each specific to the violation. If you successfully comply with all of the judge's orders, then the violation will be dismissed. If you do not successfully comply with all of the judge's orders, then the offense will be reported as a conviction, and in some cases will result in a license suspension. Please note: Deferrals are solely at the Judge's discretion.

This court DOES NOT ALLOW deferrals for any offenses occurring in a construction zone while workers present.

Requirements

- You must have a current Driver License (Occupational is accepted)
- You must have current financial responsibility (Insurance) listing YOU as a covered driver. This must be **PRINTED** for the court.
- If you are under the age of 25 and cited for a moving violation, you will also be required to complete a driving safety course as a condition of the DD.
- You are NOT eligible for DD if you held a commercial driver's license at the time the offense was committed or if you hold a commercial driver's license now, and the offense relates to motor vehicle control.

*****DEFERRALS FOR INSURANCE VIOLATIONS*****

The special expense fee for deferring an insurance violation is \$400.00 NO EXCEPTIONS

- You must have a current Driver License (Occupational is accepted)
- You must have current financial responsibility (Insurance) listing YOU as a covered driver. This must be **PRINTED** for the court.
- The special expense fee is DUE IN FULL at the time the deferral is granted.

*****DEFERRALS FOR NO DRIVER LICENSE/ DRIVING WHILE LICENSE INVALID*****

The special expense fee for deferring any driver license violation is \$400.00 NO EXCEPTIONS

- You must have a current Driver License (Occupational license is acceptable)
- You must have current financial responsibility (Insurance) listing YOU as a covered driver. This must be **PRINTED** for the court.
- The special expense fee is DUE IN FULL at the time the deferral is granted.
